

Beautiful adaptation of Janet Frame's autobiography – from small-town upbringing, through brutal mistreatment in the mental health system, to liberation as a respected author.

Saim Sadiq • 2022 • 126 mins Pakistan • M

Initially banned in its country of origin, this graceful and nuanced story of forbidden love follows a traditional young man's encounter with a transgender dancer. Winner of the Queer Palm and Jury Prize at Cannes 2022.

The Fallen Idol

Carol Reed • 1948 • 95 mins

A lonely young ambassador's son struggling to comprehend the adult world becomes the key witness in a criminal investigation in Reed's suspenseful adaptation of a Graham Greene short story.



Kelly Reichardt • 2019 • 117 mins USA • PG

A Western where bravado and bullwhips are replaced by a cow, a chef and a Chinese fugitive. "Set in the mid-19th-century Oregon Territory, Kelly Reichardt's latest film is a fable, a western, a buddy picture and a masterpiece." The New York Times

Grand Illusion

Jean Renoir • 1937 • 114 mins France • G

A funny, sad and deeply humane tale of French prisoners of war in WWI. Renoir's pacifist plea was released on the verge of a second World War and moved Orson Welles to declare: "If I could save only one film, it would be *Grand Illusion*."

Errol Morris • 2003 • 107 mins USA • PG

Director Errol Morris tussles with Robert McNamara (Secretary of Defence under Presidents Kennedy and Johnson) with extensive archival footage and probing interviews that explore US strategy from the Cuban Missile Crisis to the Vietnam War.





06 MAY Solaris

Andrei Tarkovsky • 1972 • 166 mins Soviet Union • PG

Tarkovsky's response to 2001: A Space Odyssey, Solaris follows a psychologist who is sent to a space station orbiting a distant planet to investigate the death of the captain and the declining mental state of the skeleton crew.

Goodbye, Lenin!

Wolfgang Becker • 2003 • 121 mins Germany • M

Alex is on a mission to conceal the collapse of East Germany from his patriotic, socialist mother when she wakes from her coma in this bittersweet comedy.

Christine Jeffs • 2001 • 92 mins New Zealand • M

A traditional kiwi bach holiday, in the hungover haze of 1972, is the setting for midlife crisis and adolescent turmoil. "Rain is an evocative mood piece, enriched by gorgeous visuals." Variety

Bruce Dern plays a botanist keeping the universe's last ecosystem alive on a spaceship, when the ship's owners decide they need to cut costs... Douglas Trumball (special effects artist on 2001: A Space Odyssey and Blade Runner) helms this eco-thriller in space.

Night Train to Munich

Carol Reed • 1940 • 96 mins UK • Rating TBC

A Czech scientist and his daughter escape from Nazis aided by a debonair British spy in this twisty cloak-and-dagger delight, combining comedy, romance, and thrills.

Seven Winters in Tehran

Steffi Niederzoll • 2023 • 97 mins France/Germany • E

Using smuggled footage, this documentary follows a young Iranian woman sentenced to death for killing her would-be rapist and her family's fight for justice over her seven year imprisonment.



Ambitious wheeler-dealer Jimmy Rabbitte decides to form the world's hardest working soul band from the unlikeliest of sources: depressed 1980s Dublin. "The film offers no message, no solutions, only a great time at the movies." *Time*

The Unknown

Tod Browning • 1927 • 68 mins USA • PG

The spellbinding Lon Chaney plays an armless knifethrower smitten with his circus assistant (Joan Crawford) in this twisted silent grand guignol masterpiece.

Freaks

Tod Browning • 1932 • 64 mins USA • R16

One of the most controversial Hollywood films of all time, Tod Browning brought together real-life carnival workers to play characters who discover that 'the normals' are the real monsters.

Gentlemen Prefer Blondes

Howard Hawks • 1953 • 91 mins USA • PG

Marilyn Monroe and Jane Russell play two chorus girls hunting for husbands in a glorious technicolor musical. "Both an old-fashioned romp and a shockingly progressive ode to female independence, sexual agency, and camaraderie." AV Club

Robert Wise • 1971 • 131 mins

When a satellite falls from orbit carrying an unknown alien organism, scientists scramble to control the contagion in this "riveting take on science fiction tempered with science fact." *Empire*






